

INEL Workshop 2016

Universität Hamburg will hold a workshop for the launch of the long-term INEL project on November 3-4, 2016.

The INEL project (Grammatical Descriptions, Corpora and Language Technology for Indigenous **N**orthern **E**urasian **L**anguages) aims at developing corpora –and, eventually, corpus-based grammars– for several selected languages of different families. It will mobilize the existing archival materials (e.g. manuscript field notes of XIX–XX centuries) as the main source of the corpus data. The timespan of the INEL project funded by the Academy of Sciences and Humanities in Hamburg extends over 18 years (2016–2033).

This kickoff workshop will gather the project members presenting linguistic and technical facets of the project as well as invited experts sharing their experience in working with archival data, developing corpora and leveraging language technologies for under-resourced languages.

The venue of the workshop will be the Hamburger Zentrum für Sprachcorpora (HZSK), Room 030, Max-Brauer-Allee 60, 22765 Hamburg.
